I <u>full well know</u>, the sufferings of Mrs D, yrself, ^{Carson} & Willie,— for the dear invalid, whose entire recovery will be your happy reward.— With grateful thanks to Him, Mr C, &self, unite in love ®ard, to Mrs D. yrself, &Willie.—In regard to your wishes & desires for the H.S.N.M Col'^{ge}, I have closely &carefully read every word and line, with the deepest interest, &will do all I can in due time, tho' it may not be so soon, as you or I would like—; your <u>fir</u>st desire "A separate building for the Academy." my return to New York, & see'^g Mr B.C. Wetmore (whom I so wish you to know) I think I can promise to you, when you visit us in New York, & [I] do hope to be in the city at the time. After leaving you Mch 15th 8·30 p.m. we arrived at Jacksonville s<u>ame</u> hour on the 16th, &left for Tampa on the 17th, for Key West & Havana. On the 19th, arri'^g on the 21st, where we stayed until the 24th, &left again for Tampa, arri'^g on the 26th.— My bronchial cough having left me, & Mr C, hearing of the severity of the weather at the north, we remained in Tampa until Mch 31st, &left for St Augustine. April 1st, left for Jacksonville Fla', & on the 2^d, for Charleston, arri'^g h<u>e</u>re, at 6.30 p.m. n<u>ot</u>, "foot sore & heart weary," but with wearied body, &tired feet, after having seen <u>all</u>, that was to be seen in each place, &have no desire, ever to visit Cuba or Florida again. Not being able to get tickets for Wash'^{gtn}

for the 4th, we hope to leave t<u>his eve'g or to-mor, morn'g</u>, &expect to be in New York on the 15th, at "15 West 20th St." You will find in my cousin Mr Jos. A. Hincks, n<u>ow</u> Sec'^y of Tulane University, a most valuable friend & assistant to you, in everyway, so very kind & capable, in doing anything. While I am truly grateful to anyone, who as you write, "may desire to build some Memorial, in connection with the Newcomb College," it is my request to you, that <u>no one</u>, shall er<u>ect</u> any buil<u>d</u>ing, of any k<u>ind</u>, for any purpose, on the Newcomb Grounds.—Friends giving us a dinner last eve'^g, &this hot morn'g, I must ask your kind favor, for this hurried letter, in answer to yours.—With sincerest wishes, for all you ever desire.
