Mr H. K. Pomroy, D^r Sir,

Not being able to go to Charleston as I intended, Mr C, on the 9th wired to Mr Yates Snowden, who came at once to Savannah to meet me, to whom I handed my letter to his mother, Mrs Mary A. Snowden, Pres of the Confederate Home in Charleston So Ca, named "Home for the Mothers, Widows, & Daughters, of Confederate Soldiers"—enclosing my check for \$20,000 payable to her on July 1st/93. I gave Mr Y. S. my card to you, asking him to come to N.Y. to receive the money, for his mother, thro' you, to strictly observe, secrecy, &privacy, not like Rev Dr G, which was at once exposed. I thank God, "those people" have not yet done anything, as their last threats are, "they will make trouble for any parties, to whom I give large sums, when they know it."— We left Savannah on the 10th at

10 o'c, arriving h<u>er</u>e at 10 ½ o'c [missing corner] hausted, but it has pleased God, [missing corner] for His own purposes, as He knows best. To_day being the f<u>ir</u>st o<u>ne</u>, I have had any strength.
