Editor's note

The little slip states: "Mrs. Hicks-Lord has left a will for the benefit of humanity, for its provisions will quicken the zeal and promote the activities of all household servants."

The newspaper clipping she enclosed is titled "Bishop Whipple, a Bridegoom at 74" with a large sketch of the Bishop. The article regards the marriage of the 74 year old Rev. Henry B. Whipple, Bishop of Minnesota, to the 35 year old Mrs. Evangeline Simpson, whose first husband, Michael Simpson, was a millionaire cotton manufacturer in Massachusetts. The Bishop is described as "one of the most interesting personalities in the Northwest...." By example from the article, "when the Sioux Indians rose in 1862 Bishop Whipple interceded in their behalf with President Lincoln."
