Editors' note

Mrs. Augusta W. Kellogg was a non-fiction writer. She was the author of the children's book "Our Young Folks in Norway," and several geographic and historical articles. Kellogg appears to have been a somewhat regular contributor to The New England Magazine, a monthly literary magazine published in Boston between 1884 and 1917. Essays written by Kellogg appeared in 1897, 1901, 1902 and 1904. In the January 1901 issue, Kellogg published an article titled "Public Memorials to Women," which is a rather extensive global survey of monuments to women. In closing, she considers several "quasi-public testimonials to women's worth and benevolence." In this she writes:

"The H. Sophie Newcomb Memorial College was founded in New Orleans in 1886, by Mrs. Josephine Newcomb, as a memorial to her daughter, and is devoted to the higher education of women. The college buildings occupy several acres in extent and are in the best residence section of the city. The buildings, six in number, are of
